Economic Crimes, Corruption, and Transitional Justice

Where does accountability for economic crimes, including large-scale corruption, intersect with accountability for human rights violations and what role—if any—should these crimes have in transitional justice mechanisms?

To date, transitional justice has largely compartmentalized legacies of abuse into those based on a narrow set of human rights violations and those based on economic crimes. Our guest Ruben Carranza, a senior associate at the International Center for Transitional Justice, will argue that this is an inadequate way to address both sets of abuses and will discuss possible solutions for the field going forward.
